I am pleased to report on another incredible year at Columbus Technical College. In the pages that follow, we will share some of our successes over the last 12 months and where we are now. Columbus Technical College has been an integral part of this community for more than 55 years and our presence has never been more vital than it is today. Statistics show individuals with an Associate's Degree earn about \$6,600 more per year than those with a High School diploma; over the course of one's lifetime, that number mushrooms to approximately \$400,000 and if you're interested in our high skilled academic programs like registered nursing or the industrial engineering field, the ROI is much higher.

Earning the High School diploma -or its equivalent- is a big first step in securing a satisfying life. In July of this year, Columbus Technical College was recognized by the state for its success in providing Adult Education services. This prestigious acknowledgement is based on metrics such as GED finishing rates, college entry numbers, and high employment rates upon completion.

Almost 700 young people pulled double-duty over the last year as both high school students and Columbus Technical College students - earning college credit and/or certifications through the state's dual enrollment program. This is a virtually cost-free way to get started on one's future!

Other highlights included:

- securing an articulation agreement with Valdosta State University and continuing our strong relationship with Columbus State University;

- designing, building, and opening an award-winning welding lab with the Governor's \$1.2 M world class lab grant;
- Culinary Arts students participating in a study abroad program with Ireland's Waterford Institute of Technology's Food Science program;
- distributing millions dollars in financial assistance to students through the Columbus Technical College Foundation scholarships, HOPE funds, and Federal Pell Grants;
- opening additional Adult Ed learning sites, bringing the total number to 22;
- providing 329 companies with customized training through our Economic Development division;
- securing \$2 million to renovate an Economic Development facility in time for the Pratt & Whitney QuickStart® project of 500 new hires and;
- boasting a job placement rate of 99.1% overall and 95.4% in field!

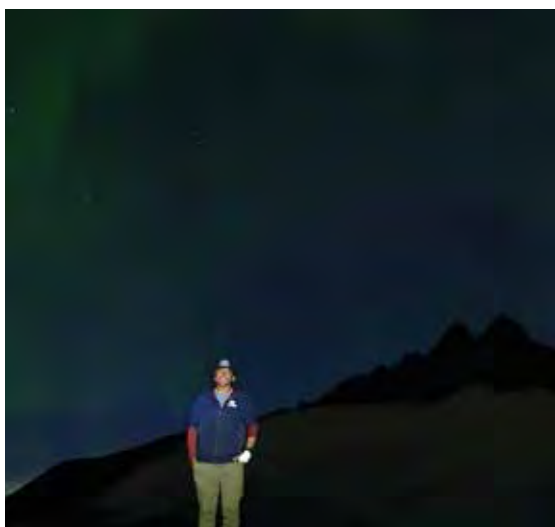
Exploring & Expanding Our Boundaries

Columbus Technical College computer networking specialist student and 2016 biology graduate Chelly Johnson is an avid environmentalist. Thanks to a push and encouragement by instructor Alicia Anderson and a donation from the Columbus Technical College Foundation, Chelly was able to experience a once-in-a-lifetime learning opportunity to visit and study the ice fields of Alaska and British Columbia this summer.

More than 1500 students from around the world applied to be part of the 2017 Juneau Icefield Research Program (JIRP) class. Chelly was one of only 25 selected to participate and the only student from the Southeastern United States. When they heard about the learning opportunity, the Columbus Technical College Foundation presented a check of \$2,500 to Chelly; she raised the remainder of the \$8,000 tuition through other donations and working part time.

Chelly says she will never forget the experience and the lessons she learned.

"Alaska was everything and more; the program, the science, such an unforgettable place and experience. If I had to pick three words to describe the trip it would be magnificent, magical, and mighty," she said.

Culinary Expedition

The Culinary Arts program at Columbus Technical College is fairly new yet its reach is already being felt on an international level. As part of a partnership with Ireland's Waterford Institute of Technology, a dozen culinary arts students and their instructor were able to travel to Ireland this summer and learn firsthand what it was like to work in five-star kitchens and resorts. The students collected fresh seaweed for ingredients, learned butchering techniques, tried their hand at traditional Irish cuisine and worked hard planning, prepping, and serving meals.

To raise money for this ten-day educational experience, the program hosted an intimate fundraising dinner called A Culinary Expedition; the Columbus Technical College Foundation and Student Leadership Council also helped offset the expenses for the Ireland trip. The culinary arts students and instructors were even presented with a Resolution from the Columbus City Council recognizing their success. Here's to many more adventures and opportunities!

ADULT EDUCATION



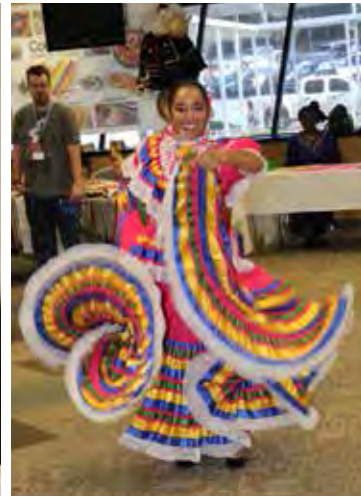
Adult Education at Columbus Technical College is making amazing strides. Over the last year, services were provided to almost 1400 students (104,610 student contact hours) in our region. To make these life-changing opportunities even more accessible, 22 locations are available in our six-county service area providing GED Prep, ELL Classes, ABE/ASE Classes, College 101 Classes and other services.

This year's Rick Perkins Instructor of the Year, Heather Morgan, represented Adult Education at the State competitions. Ms. Morgan is the first Adult Education



Instructor to represent Columbus Technical College. Dozens of area organizations have welcomed Adult Education with open arms by providing space for our instructors to come and teach classes. Thank you all so much and we are proud to call you partners in this important mission.

Natalie Miller - EAGLE Student



Natalie Miller was born in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida and moved to Columbus, Georgia at the age of ten with her mom and two other siblings. She attended Carver High School when she dropped out of school at the age of seventeen. Natalie soon became pregnant and then married the father of her child. The marriage only lasted four years causing Natalie to explore

other avenues of life that eventually led to her abusing drugs. She soon lost custody of her child and became homeless. Natalie stayed in her drug addiction for eight years feeling as if this was going to be her way of life forever. She lost all hope for herself and her future.

In November of 2014, Natalie got a call from her ex-husband encouraging her about the importance of getting herself together so she could be a part of their daughter's life. That phone call was a turning point. Natalie stopped her toxic lifestyle and just four months later, enrolled in the Adult Education program at Columbus Technical College. Natalie graduated from the Adult Education Program and soon after enrolled as a full-time student at Columbus Technical College to start her studies in the Health Science Program. Her goal is to go into the RN program at Columbus Technical College where she wants to give back to her community as a nurse. Today Natalie still works to improve the relationship between her and her daughter who is an active part of her daily life.



Natalie wants others to know that no matter what life may throw at you there is always a way out if you just believe, hold on, and don't give up.

Natalie is now a huge advocate for Adult Education. "Adult Education programs are important for building strong communities and helping people become better citizens," Natalie said. "These programs are a place for second chances and a place to start over. Because of this program, I am now on my way to graduating college and giving back to my community."

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT



Congratulations to this fantastic group of high school students who spent their summer completing the Certified Manufacturing Specialist program at Columbus Technical College. The Economic Development division of Columbus Technical College provides customized training for companies and individuals as well as continuing education and personal development opportunities. Economic Development works closely with industries in our service area to ensure they get the best workforce development training available. They also have close relationships with school districts to provide job-ready learning opportunities.

Summer CMS Program

Thirty-five students attended and graduated from the Certified Manufacturing Specialist (CMS) program this summer. The objective of the program is to introduce high school students and recent graduates to essential manufacturing principles and to provide opportunities for internships with local industry partners.

Advanced Manufacturing Program

The advanced manufacturing program is grant-funded through WIOA (Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act) and is open to transitioning members of the military, their spouses, and recently separated veterans. It consists of two weeks of classroom training with the goal of each participant obtaining a three-week internship with an industry partner.

The curriculum includes: blueprint reading, basic math,



precision measurement, forklift training and safety, CNC machining as well as an in-depth Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) class.

Georgia Quick Start

Workforce training in Georgia is provided through several initiatives, but the state's signature program is Georgia Quick Start, a free program customized for companies in numerous industries. The oldest program of its kind in the U.S., Quick Start has updated the skill sets of more than 1 million employees in 6,500 projects throughout the state.

Over the past 14 years, Quick Start has ranked No. 1 in the U.S. in all published surveys of site selection professionals. Recently Quick Start received the distinction for the fourth time in the fourth annual survey conducted and published by Area Development magazine.

In Columbus, Quick Start is helping Pratt & Whitney train more than 500 new employees as part of the company's expansion. As part of this endeavor, the Columbus Technical College Training Center on Transport Boulevard is undergoing a \$2 million renovation and transformation into a state of the art training facility. The newly renovated center will be 'ground-zero' for training Pratt & Whitney's new employees. Soon, it will also be used to train a much-needed advanced manufacturing workforce in the Columbus region.

Other Accomplishments

Saved \$1,536,944.44 for 34 companies through the GA Retraining Tax Credit program.

Over 400 high school students from our service area earned their driver's license certification through our Driver's Education training.

The Career Connect course was offered to 1065 ninth grade students in Harris, Muscogee, Stewart, Chattahoochee, and Quitman counties. This program helps strengthen the basic literacy/numeracy skills, financial literacy skills, work ethics and other employability skills, and provides career exploration for participating ninth graders as they make the transition into high school.

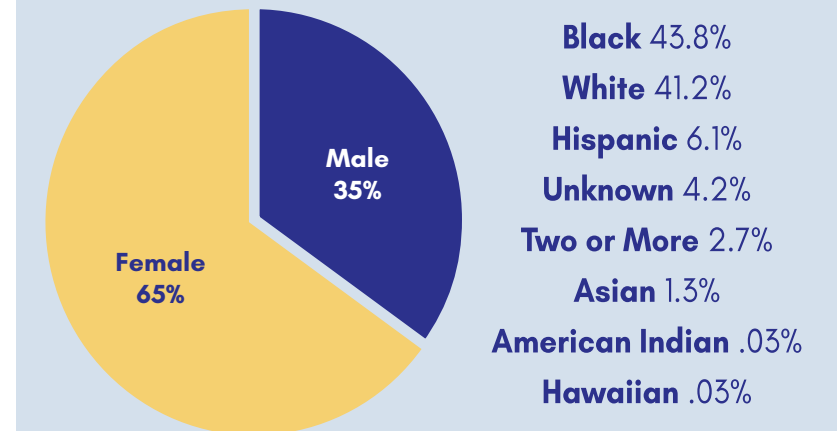

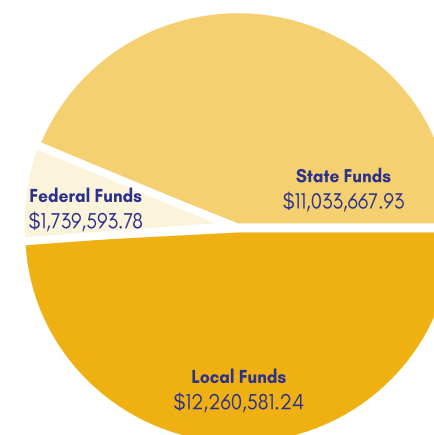

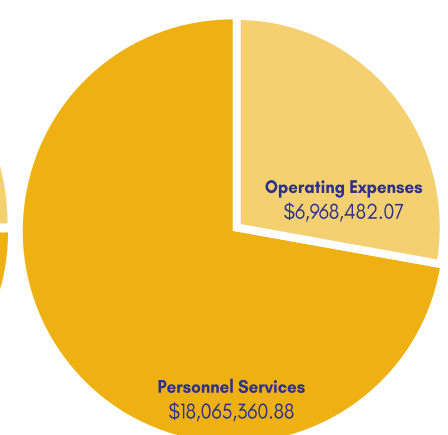
